

Undergraduate Course Descriptions

Course Descriptions: Each course is worth 3 credit hours. Credit hours are non-transferrable.

SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY

Bibliology – Bible Doctrines:

This course is a major study of the Bible in a systematic way. The principle doctrines of the Scripture will be outlined and discussed in a step by step process. This course is the base upon which you will build theological foundation.

Theology/Angelology – God and Angels

This course is the study of the biblical doctrines of God and angels. It focuses on the biblical view of the existence, nature, attributes, and works of God. The second part concerns the origin, nature, purpose, and activity of angels. It is designed to help you understand more fully their work, purpose, limitations, and ultimate destiny.

Anthropology/Hamartiology —Man and Sin

Man and Sin is an introductory study of the Biblical doctrines of the origin and nature of humankind and of the problem of sin and its effects. These subjects will be appreciated from a Biblical, systematic, and, to a lesser extent, historical perspective.

Christology—Jesus Christ our Lord

This is a study of Jesus Christ, God’s perfect man, Man’s perfect God. The study will include His preexistence in eternity, His birth, His humanity, His Crucifixion, and His resurrection.

Soteriology — Salvation

A study of the doctrine of salvation, the work of Christ in bringing lost man into fellowship with God. The course includes the doctrines of repentance, faith, conversion, regeneration, justification, adoption, sanctification, and prayer in the life of a Christian.

Pneumatology—The Holy Sprit

A Careful study of the Person and work of the third Person of the Trinity, including His identity and attributes, His work before, on, and after Pentecost, and His life in the believer is included in this course.

Ecclesiology/Eschatology—The Church & Last Things

This course covers various components and theories of the tribulation and the millennium. The contributions of prophetic and apocalyptic literature are examined. The second half of the course offers a comprehensive study of the biblical principles of the nature, mission, and function of the church. Descriptions and roles of the church offices including: pastor, elder, deacon, etc. are discussed in this course.

Pauline theology

Examining the main themes of Paul's theology: the relationship of Jew and Gentile, the human predicament, the centrality of Christ in God's redemptive plans, the future hope, the fate of Israel and of unbelievers generally, the image and role of the church, the question of eternal security, and ethical implications for behavior toward God, community, and world.

Apologetics

This is a study of the defense of the faith, particularly from the standpoint of the authority of the Bible and historical evidences of the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Issues in Contemporary Theology (Prerequisites: Systematic Theology I, II, & III)

This course is an investigation of contemporary issues confronting the formulation of evangelical systematic theology with an analysis and evaluation of current evangelical responses to each of these issues.
